TOURNAMENT REGULATIONS

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This is the WBSC Baseball World Cup Tournament Regulations, published by the World Baseball Softball Confederation (WBSC). Its application is compulsory in all competitions.

In the whole document everything that is written in masculine applies also to the feminine.

e.g.: he = she

his = her

Likewise, “competition”, “event” or “tournament” under this document is synonymous with Baseball World Cup.

The WBSC Tournament Regulations are provided in both English and Spanish, should there be any inconsistency or conflict between the English or Spanish version of this document the English version shall prevail.

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A. GENERAL NORMS

These Tournament Regulations ("Regulations", each a "Reg.") are adopted by the WBSC and enforced by the WBSC Executive Board and the responsible persons named herein. They supplement the *Official Rules of Baseball* ("Rules"). In the event of an inconsistency between a Rule, Regulation or the WBSC Statutes, or an interpretation of or a dispute in the application of one of these, the WBSC Executive Director or his delegate will issue a ruling.

As used in these Regulations, a "WBSC Competition" is a WBSC Baseball World Cup and a qualifier for one of these, including: U-23 Baseball World Cup; U-18 Baseball World Cup; U-15 Baseball World Cup; U-12 Baseball World Cup; Women's Baseball World Cup, Continental or Regional Games, or World or Regional Championships; or another Baseball competition sanctioned by the WBSC. A "competition" refers to a particular WBSC Competition that is being conducted under these Regulations.

Every notice given under these Regulations before, during or after a competition ("Notice") is to be made by e-mail or first-class post according to contact information held by the WBSC in connection with that competition. Every Notice is deemed effective if given by e-mail on the day and time sent or if by first-class post two (2) business days after posting.

A1 PLAYERS ELIGIBILITY

A1.1 All players in any WBSC official competition ("competitor" or "player") must be in possession of a valid passport of the country, territory, or region of the National Federation that is entering them.

A1.2 All disputes relating to the determination of the country which a competitor may represent in a WBSC Competition shall be resolved by the WBSC Executive Board.

A1.3 A competitor who is a national of two or more countries at the same time may represent any one of them, as he may elect. However, after having represented one of them in a WBSC Competition, they may not represent another country or region unless they meet the conditions set forth in Reg. A1.4 that apply to persons who have changed their nationality or acquired a new nationality. (Note: a non-official Competition may be considered an exception to this rule).

A1.4 A competitor who has represented one country in a WBSC Competition and who has changed their nationality or acquired a new nationality shall not participate in any WBSC Competition to represent their new country or region until three calendar years have passed since the competitor last represented their former country. (Note: a non-official WBSC Competition may be considered an exception to this rule). This period may be reduced or cancelled with the agreement of both National Federations and the approval of the WBSC Executive Board.

A1.5 If an associated state, province or overseas department, a country or colony acquires independence, if a country becomes incorporated within another country by reason of a change of border, or if a new National Olympic Committee ("NOC") is recognised by the International Olympic Committee ("IOC"), a competitor may continue to represent the country or region to which they belong or belonged. However, they may, if preferred, choose to represent their country or be entered in the WBSC Competition by his new Federation or NOC if one exists. This particular choice may only be made once.

A1.6 In all cases not expressly addressed in this Reg. A1, in particular, where in those cases in which a competitor would be in a position to represent a country other than that of which they are a national or have a choice as to the country they intend to represent, the WBSC Executive Board may take all decisions of a general or individual nature, and, in particular, issue specific requirements relating to nationality, citizenship, domicile or residence of the competitors, including the duration of any waiting period.

A1.7 Should an eligibility violation occur, and a player be proven to be ineligible prior to any games being played, they are automatically removed from their team's Final Team Roster ("FTR") and will not be allowed to participate in that competition. The Technical Commission of the competition will notify the WBSC Executive Board for further action.

A1.8 Should an eligibility violation be discovered during a competition and after the player has played in one or more games, they are automatically removed from the FTR, and any game in which they actually played shall be considered a forfeited game for his team. The team shall continue to play in the competition, and the infraction shall be reported by the Technical Commission of the competition to the WBSC Executive Board for further action.

A1.9 Should a violation of eligibility be discovered after the competition, the case can be submitted by the WBSC Technical Commission, or by the National Federation, directly to the WBSC Executive Board for further action. In such a case the WBSC Executive Board is empowered to act.

A1.10 During a competition, a player, removed from the FTR for any eligibility violation, cannot be replaced by another player. A team can be penalized for an eligibility violation only if a player has actually played in a game.

A1.11 In any case, it is the obligation of the team or the National Federation, officially protesting the ineligibility of a player, to produce valid proof, the documentation and all the information regarding the violation in writing at the moment when filing the protest.

A1.12 Age limit for each WBSC Baseball World Cup is determined by the year in which they were born. Players must turn the minimum age for any given WBSC World Cup in the year in which the tournament takes place:

A.1.13 Provisional Members

A National Team from a WBSC Provisional Member may participate only in a WBSC Regional or Continental level competition ("Regional Competition") but not in a World Cup, the Olympic Games and the Premier12, or any qualification events to a World Cup, the Olympic Games and the Premier12.

- The provisions of Reg. A1. to A1.12 apply to a Provisional Member player, Club Team and National Team in a Regional Competition.
- A player who is a national of two or more countries/regions, one of which is a WBSC Provisional Member, may on evidence of nationality elect to represent either (i) a Provisional Member National Team or (ii) a Full Member National Team. Having done so, such a player can not represent any other National Team in the same Calendar Year.
- If a player that played for a WBSC Provisional Member National Team wishes to change and play for the National Team of a full WBSC Member, or vice versa, the player requires written permission to do so from the WBSC Provisional Member, the WBSC Full Member and the WBSC Executive Board.

A2 PROVISIONAL TEAM ROSTER (PTR)

A2.1 No later than thirty (30) calendar days prior to the beginning of the competition, all participating National Federations must communicate to the WBSC the Provisional (maximum 45 players) Team Roster (PTR), through the online platform: <http://my.wbcs.org> and the following information must be uploaded:

- Name;
- Lastname;
- Date of Birth;

- Passport Number;
- Passport Expiration Date;
- Passport Copy (in JPEG file); and
- Headshot (WxH of 600x800px, ratio of 3:4, in JPEG file).

Note: User ID and Password are communicated to all National Federations from WBSC Headquarters.

A2.2 If a person named on a PTR becomes unavailable after the PTR deadline due to injury, sickness or any other reasons that is approved by WBSC, they may be replaced on that PTR. National Federations must obtain WBSC's approval in writing before making such changes. If for a medical reason, a medical certificate in English or Spanish language must accompany the request when submitted to the WBSC. Failure to report and obtain WBSC approval will result in the ineligibility of that person from the competition.

A2.3 The non-fulfilment of the deadline to submit the documents mentioned under Reg. A2.1., the incomplete submission or lack of fulfilment of any of the sections shall be sanctioned with a USD one hundred (100) fine per day until the problem is corrected.

A3 FINAL TEAM ROSTER (FTR)

A3.1 No later than ten (10) days prior to the beginning of the competition, all National Federations and/or Associate Members must communicate to the WBSC the Final Team Roster (FTR), through the online platform: <http://my.wbcs.org> and the following information must be uploaded:

- Name;
- Lastname;
- Preferred Name;
- Preferred Lastname;
- Date of Birth;
- Passport Number;
- Passport Expiration Date;
- Passport Copy (in JPEG file);
- Headshot (WxH of 600x800px, ratio of 3:4, in JPEG file);
- Uniform Number; and
- Position, Height, Throw/Bat (for players only).

A3.2 During the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting, the Delegation Leader shall submit the following to the Technical Commission:

- a) A current valid passport ("Passport") for each player on the Final Team Roster (FTR) must be presented at the Tournament Technical Meeting to the Technical Commission for official roster activation of the player(s). If a player(s) has not arrived in the host country the federation could present a copy of the player(s) passport for roster registration purpose only. Additional members of the Delegation such as Delegation Leader, Team Manager, Coaches, Trainers, etc. shall appear on the FTR but do not need to submit their Passport; and

- b) The name, e-mail and social media (i.e., WhatsApp) address and phone number (of the delegation leader, Team Manager and media officer of each Delegation.

A3.3 A maximum of 5 (five) players are allowed to be replaced on the FTR. The WBSC must be informed in writing of such changes at any moment up to and including the start of the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting, which notice of change must be in the hands of the Technical Director at the time of the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting. If for any reason, previously known and accepted by the WBSC, a team arrives in the country later, the Delegation Leader must ensure that the Technical Director gets these documents promptly upon the team's arrival. Those 5 (five) players may come from either inside or outside the PTR.

A3.4 Official Team Delegations at WBSC Competitions vary in size depending on the age category and level. The specific number of Team Members for each Baseball World Cup is established in the following chart, including the minimum roster size required to participate in the event. If a team registers or arrives at the event with fewer players than the established minimum roster size, the team will still be permitted to participate; however, it will be considered at fault, and fines and sanctions will be imposed by the WBSC on the relevant National Federation.

Note: National Federations may request to bring extra personnel in addition to the Official Team Delegation Members set. The LOC may assist to find appropriate accommodation and food upon request. Team delegations are responsible to cover all the associated costs of extra personnel.

A3.5 The non-fulfilment of the deadline to submit the documents required under Reg. A3.1., the incomplete submission or lack of fulfilment of any of Reg. A3 shall be sanctioned with a non-appealable fine of USD five hundred (500) fine per day until the problem is corrected.

A3.6 If more than 5 (five) players on FTR become unavailable after the FTR deadlines has passed and before the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting, due to injury, sickness or any other reasons and if National Federation/Associate Member wishes to replace such player(s), the reasons for such unavailability must be communicated to WBSC in writing. WBSC will review the request and communicate if the request could be granted. Without WBSC's approval in writing, no changes are permitted.

A3.7 Once the player verification at Technical Meeting is over, no changes to the FTR will be permitted for the duration of the competition. Copies of the FTR shall be provided to each Delegation Leader, Technical Director, Technical Commissioners, Scorers, Anti-Doping Officer and Media before the start of the competition

A4 PRE-TOURNAMENT TECHNICAL/ORGANISATIONAL MEETING

A4.1 On the day before the start of the competition, an information meeting will be held, to discuss all rules, technical, scheduling, and organisational issues concerning the competition. The place, date and time of the meeting will be made available to the teams as soon as possible.

A4.2 The Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting will be chaired by the Tournament Director accompanied by the Technical Director, the Umpire Director (or their assistant assigned for the competition), the Scoring Director, the Anti-Doping Commissioner, a representative of the Local Organising Committee (LOC) and a representative of the WBSC Events Department. Relevant technical matters of the competition will be discussed in this meeting.

Note: Any material shared for this meeting, printed or digital, should be in English and/or Spanish at a minimum. Attendance at this meeting and the receipt of materials signifies the understanding and acceptance by each delegation and its members of all conditions, requirements, Rules, and Regulations.

A5 DOPING CONTROL

A5.1 Doping Control will be conducted in accordance with the WBSC Anti-Doping Rules, which comply with the World Anti-Doping Code.

A5.2 During the competition, the frequency of doping controls will be decided by the WBSC.

A5.3 The WBSC will appoint a WBSC Anti-Doping Officer to oversee the anti-doping programme. The WBSC Anti-Doping Officer may vary the test distribution in consultation with the head Doping Control Officer ("DCO").

A5.4 For games in which doping controls will be conducted, the following procedures shall be followed.

- a) At the end of the first half of the fourth inning, the head DCO, the WBSC Anti-Doping Officer and one of the Technical Commissioners in charge of the game (if requested),

with a copy of the starting line-up cards, shall meet in the Doping Control Station. The DCO will have a copy of the FTR for the selection process.

Note: In the continuous development of the fight against doping and in trying to make everything in line with international guidelines, the WBSC outsources its anti-doping services and is committed to secrecy and data protection as required by WADA (World Anti-Doping Agency). In this sense, the WBSC recommends the minimum involvement of the WBSC Family and the WBSC Officials to ensure the best execution of the sample collection. However, as indicated, where specifically requested, collaboration between the parties involved is required.

- b) The Team Manager must confirm to the TC that all players are at the game, if one is missing (for injury, sickness, etc.), and why and where the player is (for Doping test reasons).
- c) The DCO will provide a random system. In the case of no available system, player names or numbers will be written on pieces of paper and cut up.
- d) A random selection process will be conducted for each team. This will include the selection of reserve players in the event the original selected player is seriously injured during the game.
- e) If one player from each team is selected, all players will be included in the draw and one reserve player selected. If two players from each team are being tested, the first selection will be from the starting line-up card and the second from the FTR. The reserve selections will be made from the FTR.
- f) While a player may be subject to doping control on more than one occasion, the WBSC Anti-Doping Officer may ask for a redraw if the player has already been tested twice at the same competition.
- g) The selections will be marked on the line-up card, signed by the parties in attendance and given to the DCO.
- h) The names of the selected players shall not be communicated to the teams before the end of the game.

A5.5 Players must stay at the field for the duration of the game. The Technical Commissioners assigned to the game and the Executive Director (or Tournament Director in his absence) shall be informed immediately in case a player needs to be absent from the field or tournament at any time through ejection or another reason.

A5.6 If a selected player is seriously injured and needs to be immediately hospitalised, the reserve player selected from the same team shall be tested instead. In such a case, medical evidence on the serious status of the injury must be given to the WBSC Anti-Doping Officer. The injured player may still be selected for doping control by WBSC once they have recovered. For example, a player is hurt before the doping procedure on a Monday and goes to the hospital. On Tuesday, the player is taken off the roster but is still in the country at the hotel or at the game. That player is still eligible to be tested just as the rest of the players on the FTR are eligible to be tested. In short, any player on the FTR who is injured is still subject to the same drug testing procedures as the rest of the team.

A5.7 Any player on the FTR not present at the game may be selected for doping control, whether still in the host city or not.

A5.8 The LOC is responsible for ensuring that the Doping Control Station is properly equipped, ready for use and maintained in a suitable manner at all times.

A5.9 Doping control will take place at all WBSC Competitions and age categories except at U-12 and U-15 Baseball World Cups.

A6 AWARDS

A6.1 Team Awards

- Only players whose teams qualify for the Super Round or Finals competitions are eligible for the Individual Awards identified in A6.2 with the exception of the Gold Medal Game MVP who must play in the Gold Medal Game. For the pitcher – ERA, Batting Champion and Slugging Champion awards, each eligible player must also satisfy the minimum requirements outlined in the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* A2.4 and A2.5 Individual Award Winners will be presented with an award at the Closing Ceremony.
- The top hitters, pitchers and baserunners identified in A6.2 shall be based on the statistics at the end of the last game in the Super Round / Finals competition before the Medal Round begins. For competitions with a Super Round, statistics from both the Opening and Super Rounds of play shall be utilised. For WBSC two-stage competitions, the statistics will only come from the Finals competition (not the Group Stage). Any ties will be broken according to the criteria listed in A6.2.
- The Outstanding Defensive Player shall be selected by members of the WBSC Technical Commission and Media Department at each competition that includes a medal round. The Most Outstanding Player shall be selected by members of the WBSC Technical Commission and Media Department at all events, including Group Stage competitions. These awards will consider player performance for the entire event, including Medal Games.
- The Gold Medal Game MVP Award shall be selected by members of the WBSC Technical Commission and Media Department at each competition that includes a Gold Medal Game. This award will be based exclusively on player performance in the Gold Medal Game.
- Individual Player Awards listed in A6.2 will be presented at the end of each competition, as applicable.

A6.3 All-World Team

The All-World Team shall be selected by the WBSC Technical Commission and WBSC Media Department members at each competition that includes a medal round. Players from every team competing at these events are eligible to be selected to the All-World Team and player performance in all games may be considered, including medal games. One player to be selected at each position, unless otherwise noted. The All-World Team will be announced through WBSC media outlets only.

A6.4 The Scoring Director (or Coordinator) will deliver the names of the statistic based awards to the WBSC prior to the Gold Medal Game to organise the closing ceremony. The Technical Director will deliver the names of the Outstanding Defensive Player, Most Outstanding Player, Gold Medal Game MVP and All-World Team to WBSC during the Gold Medal Game or during the final game of the Group Stage competition, as applicable.

A6.5 Reallocation of Medals

The WBSC is taking every possible step to ensure fair competition and to recognise the achievements of players whose results are obtained in a clean, honest, and unbiased manner. The document defining the procedures that will be followed for the Reallocation of Medals can be found in the documents section on the WBSC website.

A7 CONDUCT, INFRACTIONS, FINES AND SUSPENSIONS

A6.1 Scope

- An action by a person named on an FTR that constitutes an infraction may take place before, during or after a game, or away from the ballpark during a competition. Such an infraction will lead to the imposition of a fine and/or suspension.
- Under these Regulations and Rules 3.1.2 and 3.1.7, a manager/head coach, coach, or a player or coach acting as a manager/head coach, is responsible for the actions of every person on an FTR before, during or after a game and away from the ballpark during a competition. It will be an infraction under these Regulations and a violation of Rules 3.1.2 and 3.1.7, or a violation giving rise to a Disciplinary Action under the Disciplinary By-Laws, to cause, encourage, facilitate or further an act, fail to prevent an act or fail to take reasonable steps to prevent any person on an FTR from doing an act that is or would be an infraction under these Regulations or a violation of a Rule.
- An infraction of a Rule will lead to an Effect as provided for in the Rules. An infraction of a Regulation will automatically incur a fine in USD and may incur a suspension or other sanction. A fine or suspension may be assessed on one or more persons named on an FTR or a team. A fine will be invoiced to the National Federation in question upon the conclusion of the competition. Any appeal will be handled as per Reg. B4. Delegations and National Federations will be notified about an infraction, fine and suspension by notice under Reg B.5.1 during the competition or as soon thereafter as possible. It is the responsibility of the National Federation involved to ensure that a

fine is paid and that a suspension is honoured. Failure to do so will result in a National Federation's team or the individual involved being unable to participate in a WBSC Competition, as well as additional fines being imposed and the National Federation being deemed not to be in Good Standing.

- d) An act or omission that takes place during a competition that constitutes an infraction may be identified or confirmed during or after that competition by corroborated personal statements, audio or video recordings or referral to the WBSC Executive Director by an Umpire, Umpire Director, Technical Director, Technical Commissioner, from that competition. Any such identified or confirmed infraction will result in a fine or suspension or may, under Reg. A7.1 e), result in a Disciplinary Action.
- e) Notwithstanding any provision of the WBSC Statutes, a By-Law, these Regulations or the Rules, the Executive Board acting by the Executive Director reserves the right, having considered all relevant facts and with Notice to all concerned, to commence a Disciplinary Action leading to a Sanction in lieu of the imposition of a fine and/or a suspension for an infraction that involved intentional, serious, unethical, improper, illegal or unreasonable behaviour, or causes serious injury to a person or damage to property, which infraction occurred before, during or after a game or away from the ballpark during a competition.

A7.2 The following is the list of infraction levels and associated fines and suspensions. A suspension can be given for a period of time or a number of games, or both.

a) A Level Infractions

A level is an infraction of rules that is considered crucial for competition success or that causes damage, harm, or serious negative effects on international baseball. The fine for an A level infraction is a minimum of \$1000 and carries the possibility of a suspension or, as provided for in Reg. A7.3, a further sanction. The following are examples of A level infractions:

- Not leaving the dugout, playing field and ballpark promptly after ejection;
- Any form of communication during a game between stands and a dugout, playing field or bullpen by any means detected either during or after a game, whether or not after an ejection;
- Foreign substance/doctored baseball;
- Physically aggressive behaviour or fighting;
- Altered bat;
- Non-presence of a team in the competition after confirming participation;
- Intentional throwing at a batter;
- Throwing equipment at or in direction of an Umpire or TC;
- Use of electronic devices during game in the clubhouse, dugouts, field of play and bullpens; and

- Changing the starting pitcher or line-up without communication and/or valid reason.

b) B Level Infractions

B level is an infraction of rules that is considered important for game operations and/or also is a behaviour that is considered unsportsmanlike. The fine for a B level infraction is \$500 - \$999. The following are examples of B level infractions:

- Inappropriate comments directed at an Umpire or TC;
- Contacting an Umpire or TC; and
- Ejection.

c) C Level Infractions

C level is an infraction of logistical and/or routine rules in nature. The fine for a C level infraction is \$100 - \$499. The following are examples of C level infractions:

- delay or absence in the technical meeting without prior notice;
- failure to follow regulations concerning uniform colour and related Regulations;
- failure by the LOC to follow guidelines on competition venue use and maintenance;
- failure by the LOC to meet the protection and security regulations of team delegation members on the playing field; and
- when non-authorized personnel enters/does not leave the dugout or playing field after being instructed by an Umpire or TC.

The following actions are non-exclusive examples of infractions, actions, fines, and suspensions. These serve as guidelines for the fines and/or suspensions that the Technical Director and the WBSC Executive Director will impose. The fact that an action is not listed below does not mean that it is not an infraction or otherwise capable of resulting in a fine or suspension. For the avoidance of doubt, a single act, omission or incident may under the circumstances result in multiple infractions, and two or more acts, omissions or incidents, whether or not related, may result in two or more incidents, each with a fine or a fine and a suspension.

The circumstances involving an action will be taken into account in imposing an infraction, a fine and/or a suspension. Depending upon the circumstances, an Umpire, TC, WBSC Executive Director or Technical Director may eject or suspend a team member for an A or B level infraction and impose a fine.

During a game, a person ejected from a game must leave the dugout, playing field and ballpark promptly (within 5 minutes) and unless selected for doping testing remain so removed until two hours after the game in which they were involved ends. A person that is ejected or sanctioned cannot return to the competition venue while the suspension is in place without the prior written consent of the WBSC Executive Director or the Tournament Director and cannot engage in any form of communication, directly or indirectly, with any team member during the time that he/she is ejected or suspended for. In the youth categories (i.e., U-12, U-15, or U-18), ejected players are required to stay with their coach (or designated team official) in the team area, at whatever location the player

is required to go. i.e., locker room. A team member that engages in an action before or after a game or away from the competition venue during the competition that would in the reasonable opinion of an Umpire, TC, WBSC Executive Director or Tournament Director constitute an infraction resulting in ejection is suspended from their next game and fined, must comply fully with the provisions of this paragraph as if they had been ejected during a game.

Note: The WBSC Executive Director has the ability to make additional decisions at his discretion.

A7.3 If a team member intentionally, recklessly, or wilfully commits an A level infraction or encourages another person to commit an A level infraction, the Technical Director and the WBSC Executive Director may impose a fine, penalty and/or suspension beyond those stated in Reg. A7.2 they find appropriate and justified. Any appeal of the decision will be taken up by the Jury of Appeal.

A7.4 Conduct on or off the field: damages caused by any member of a delegation leading to damage to the installation where they are housed, the competition facilities or transport units, or to any other area, will be the direct responsibility of the National Federation they represent. The host country, LOC and/or Organising Committee shall not be responsible for the financial situation of any Delegation member. The WBSC Executive Director may impose any fine, penalty or sanction that he finds appropriate and justified. Any appeal of the decision will be taken up by the Jury of Appeal, which will make the final decision.

A7.5 Any suspension imposed in terms of games in relation to an ejection, infraction or any violation pronounced on any Team Delegation Member outside of a Tournament or not served during an official WBSC Event for which they were intended (elimination or the last game in the Tournament) are carried over to the National Team's next official game.

A7.6 When an infraction, fine or suspension is to be imposed, the Technical Director, in cooperation with WBSC Headquarters, will deliver by Notice the decision citing the person involved, the action constituting an infraction and any fine or suspension ("Decision"). Notice of a Decision will be given to the National Federation and the person(s) involved (a) if at a competition within 24 hours after the incident occurred or was identified and confirmed or (b) if after a competition as soon thereafter as possible, in both instances setting forth the deadline for the purpose of an appeal under Reg B.4. The Decision shall be duly signed by the Technical Director and other parties involved. As stated under "General Norms" All such notices and communications shall be deemed to have been duly given at the time the email is sent; delivered by hand, if personally delivered; or two Business Days after being deposited in the mail, postage prepaid, if mailed.

B COMPETITION ADMINISTRATION

B1 COMPETITION OFFICIALS

B1.1 WBSC Executive Director

The WBSC Executive Director is the highest authority in all WBSC Competitions. The Responsibilities of the WBSC Executive Director, or in his absence the Tournament Director, include the following:

- a) Enforce all WBSC Statutes, Rules and Regulations, and agreements between the WBSC, the National Federations and the LOC;
- b) Review arrangements with the LOC Chairperson for the organisation of the competition, which include all logistical aspects such as accommodation, transportation, protocol, etc. and all related aspects;
- c) Harmonise the interests represented by the WBSC, the LOC, the National Federations, Umpires and the Technical Commissioners working in the competition;
- d) Ensure that the Jury of Appeal is constituted and empowered to act if the situation arises;
- e) Ensure that the LOC facilitates and enforces all matters related to the rights and privileges of WBSC and competition sponsors regarding the competition;
- f) Other than hearings conducted by or decisions taken by a Jury of Appeal, arbitrate and have final authority in making a decision regarding any disputes that cannot be resolved by negotiations among any or all of the groups or organisations involved in the competition;

- g) Enforce the decision of a Jury of Appeal;
- h) Convene and chair with the Technical Director the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting;
- i) Act as the official WBSC spokesperson to all media;
- j) In the absence of the WBSC President or his specifically designated representative, represent the WBSC in all formal acts and presentations related to the competition;
- k) Inform the WBSC Executive Board about the matters regarding the competition organisation;
- l) Prepare the final official report for consideration by the Executive Board;
- m) Take a final decision in regard to the game schedule after consulting the Technical Director and LOC; and
- n) During or after a Competition, cooperate with the Technical Director, Umpire Director, Umpires and Technical Commissioners to identify or confirm infractions that occur or occurred in a Competition and recommend the imposition of fines and suspensions.

B1.2 Technical Commission

A Technical Commission, recommended by the WBSC Technical Commission, will be appointed by the WBSC with the approval of the WBSC Executive Director. Its functions and responsibilities are the following:

- a) Supervise all technical aspects of the competition;
- b) Compile, verify and submit to the WBSC all technical related data of the competition;
- c) Control the eligibility and the credentials of the players;
- d) Inspect the playing fields and practice facilities for the competition;
- e) Interpret and enforce Rules and Regulations;
- f) In the event of suspended games, the Technical Commission will propose the adjustment of the competition schedule in consultation with the WBSC Event Department. Any changes in the schedule require the final approval of the WBSC Executive Director or Tournament Director;
- g) Receive and judge as first instance protests related to technical matters from teams;
- h) Rule as the first instance in discipline cases or infractions in the dugout and on the playing field involving team members; and
- i) During or after a Competition, cooperate with the Technical Director, Umpire Director, Umpires, other Technical Commissioners and the WBSC Tournament Director to identify or confirm infractions that occur or occurred in a Competition and recommend the imposition of fines and suspensions.

At least one member of the Technical Commission for the competition must be present at each game to supervise all technical aspects of the game and the fulfilment of the Rules and Regulations.

At games selected for doping controls, one Technical Commissioner appointed for the game may be requested to participate in the selection of players for doping control. This will occur at the end of the first half of the fourth inning in the Doping Control Station (unless another location is agreed).

B1.3 Technical Director

The WBSC, after consultation with the Technical Commission, will appoint one Technical Director for each Competition. The WBSC may also appoint one Assistant Technical Director for each Competition. The responsibilities of the Technical Director include the following:

- a) Assign the Technical Commission members to daily game supervision;
- b) Liaise with WBSC and Technical Commission members regarding game delays, rescheduling and cancellation to submit jointly a proposal to the WBSC Executive Director / Tournament Director, who is charged with making the final decision;
- c) Gather relevant statistical and game report information from Technical Commission members;
- d) Chair the meetings of the Technical Commission to review issues associated with technical areas of competition, and with the Executive Director to determine actions related to infractions, discipline or protests;
- e) Proceed to the final review and approval of competition and practice venues;
- f) Present all Technical Competition items at the Pre-Tournament Technical Meeting;
- g) Liaise with the Technical Commission and Tournament Director to confirm the duties for the Assistant Technical Director, if appointed.
- h) Chair the All-World Team and MVP selection meeting; and
- i) During or after a Competition, cooperate with the Tournament Director, Umpires and Technical Commissioners to identify or confirm infractions that occur or occurred in a competition and recommend the imposition of fines and suspensions.

B1.4 Jury of Appeal

The Executive Director or his duly authorised WBSC delegate will appoint a Jury of Appeal comprising of a chairman and two (2) other members. Each member must be independent and free from any conflicts of interest with respect to any matter arising thereunder, including the appealing National Federation and the person(s) involved.

The Jury of Appeal is the body of appeal for infractions, fines, judgments, or suspensions dictated by the Technical Commission occurring during a competition. It will have no application in the judgments dictated by the Technical Commission in cases related to the Rules or a Disciplinary Action under the Disciplinary By-Laws. Only the Technical Commission decisions that are not related to the Rules of the Game may be appealed in front of the Jury of Appeal.

B1.5 Umpires

All Umpires for the competition, recommended by the WBSC Baseball Umpire Commission, must be appointed by the WBSC with the approval of the WBSC Executive Director. The umpires' functions and responsibilities are listed under Rule 4.1 of the *WBSC Officials Rules of Baseball*.

Two (2) Umpires of a same participating country may work together in a game, but an umpire shall not be allowed to take part as Home-plate umpire in a game in which the National Team of his country is playing. Every attempt will be made in order for Umpires, even host team country Umpires, not to be assigned to the games of their countries. Game Management Clock or Umpire Video Review operators are not subject to this regulation. At least three (3) Umpires will be assigned to each game.

At the beginning of the competition, an Umpire Pre-Tournament meeting will be conducted by the Umpire Director. The Executive Director, the Technical Director, a representative of the LOC, and other selected WBSC staff may be requested to attend this meeting. During the competition, a daily Umpire meeting may be held as required. The Umpire Director will chair this meeting.

B1.6 Umpire Director

The WBSC, after consultation with the WBSC Baseball Umpire Commission, will appoint one member as Umpire Director for the competition. The WBSC may also appoint an Assistant Umpire Director for each Competition. The responsibilities of the Umpire Director include the following.

- a) Carry on the final inspection and approval of competition venues, determining the specific ground rules for each field of play;
- b) Present ground rules and any other pertaining items at the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting;
- c) Assign Umpire crews to daily games;
- d) Liaise with the WBSC to confirm assignments of Umpires;
- e) Liaise with Umpires and TCs regarding game delays, rescheduling, cancellations, and any other matters that arise during the competition;
- f) Supervise and evaluate each Umpire during the competition, compiling information to present a final evaluation report after the tournament;
- g) Chair the Umpire tournament meetings before and during the tournament to review items associated with umpiring the competition;
- h) Oversee video review and game management clocks operation;
- i) Liaise with the Umpire Commission and the Tournament Director to confirm the duties of the Assistant Umpire Director, if appointed; and
- j) After the completion of the competition, the Umpire Director will submit a complete report to the WBSC Executive Director.

B1.7 Scorers

The board of Scorers shall consist of a sufficient number scorers (recommended by the WBSC Scoring Director and appointed by the WBSC) to officially score and register each game officially and produce a “live” online transmission of the play-by-play of each game on WBSC website under the supervision of the Competition Scoring Director and the Technical Director. All Scorers shall be appointed by the WBSC. The scorers’ functions and responsibilities are listed under Rule 15.2 of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*.

Each game shall be recorded by two or more Scorers. At the end of each game, the Scorer(s) shall give game results (box-score) and make them available to all parties through the event website.

B1.8 Scoring Director

The WBSC, after consultation with the Scoring Commission, will appoint one member as Scoring Director for the competition. The responsibilities of the Scoring Director include the following.

- a) Carry on the final inspection and approval of Scorers working spaces at the competition venues;
- b) Attend the Pre-Tournament Technical / Organisational Meeting to cover any items related to scoring, tiebreakers, etc., that may arise during the meeting;
- c) Assign Scorer crews to daily games;
- d) Liaise with the WBSC Event Staff to confirm assignments of Scorers;
- e) Liaise with scorers regarding game delays, rescheduling and cancellation, or any other matters that arise during the competition;
- f) Supervise and evaluate each Scorer during the competition, compiling information to present a final evaluation report after the competition;
- g) Chair the Scorers tournament meetings before and during the competition to review items associated with scoring the competition;
- h) Finalise team rosters after the Pre-Tournament Technical / Organisational Meeting and publish the initial Daily Report 0 on the tournament website by the end of the day prior to starting the tournaments;
- i) Compile the required Daily Report and publish on the tournament website within 2 hours following the completion of the final game of each day;
- j) Ensure the required tournament statistical information is updated on the tournament website at the end of each day;
- k) Provide statistical data to the Technical Commission for the election of the All-World Team;
- l) Provide tiebreaker and/or statistical information to the Tournament Director upon request; and
- m) Provide list of Individual Award winners to Tournament Director upon completion of the games determining the calculation for the awards.

B1.9 Anti-Doping Officer

The Anti-Doping Officer appointed by the WBSC will oversee the competition anti-doping programme. This will include ensuring that the facilities for doping control are secure and appropriate, overseeing the doping control process, including player selection, notification and the sample collection process, and making decisions on any issues arising during this process.

B2 OTHERS

B2.1 Bat Boys/Girls

. For all games the bat boys/girls shall be furnished by the LOC. The bat boys/girls of each team shall be kept close to the dugout when the team is at bat. They must be at least 15 years-old, and they must wear uniforms and double-ear flap protective batting helmets. They must receive proper training on their functions and responsibilities from the LOC. Infractions may result in ejection of the bat boy/girl.

Also, teams may bring their own bat boys/girls as long as they are at least 15 years old and in appropriate uniforms and double-ear protective batting helmets during games. Teams are responsible for all associated costs.

B2.2 Team Attachés/Interpreters

The LOC will assign a person who speaks the language of the host country and Spanish or English to act as interpreter during the games. This person shall be permitted to sit in the team dugout of the team to which they are assigned. Note: If a coach for the team is also serving as an interpreter, the manager must let the home plate Umpire know about this at the pre-game meeting at home plate.

B2.3 TV Cameramen and Photographers

WBSC authorised TV cameramen and photographers who have been authorized by WBSC are allowed to be at restricted areas on the playing field during pre-game and post-game activities. They must always wear an official WBSC Media bib/vest as well as their accreditation in order to access the corresponding areas. During the game, when the game is not in play, WBSC approved TV cameramen may also be on the playing field provided that they will not interfere with any aspect of the operation of the game.

B2.4 First Aid

Medical and first aid attendance shall be available all the time during the competition and practices. LOC is responsible to make sure adequate staff and facilities are assigned to the competition. Adequate staff and facilities are defined as having a certified first aid attendant present with ambulance and doctor on call.

B3 PROTEST

B3.1 Protests during games related to a misapplication or misinterpretation of rules by umpires on the field are allowed as per *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* Rule 7.12 and must be ruled on immediately. The opposing team must wait for the decision before they leave

the playing field and if on defence, must remain on the field. No game may be played under protest for a later decision. No protest shall be permitted on decisions by the Video Review Official.

B3.2 The manager or acting manager shall notify the Home Plate Umpire, in accordance with *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* Rule 7.12.1, with their intent to protest a misapplication or misinterpretation of *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*. He must tell the Umpire what rule he is protesting, and:

- a) If the game has Umpire Video Review in place, the Crew Chief will initiate a Crew Chief rules review as per *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*, Appendix 2, Rule B3, to review the play and its rule interpretation and/or application. Hence, such procedure does not produce a protest, but rather a Crew Chief initiated review, and does not require any fee.

After consultation with the Video Review Official, who may review both the rule and the entire play utilising Video Review, the Umpires will render a ruling and that ruling will be final and not subject to appeal.

- b) If the game does not have Umpire Video Review in place, the Home Plate Umpire will stop the game and then notify the opposing Team Manager, the Technical Commissioners assigned to that game and other necessary parties including the Official Scorers and Public Address Announcer that a protest has been filed. The Umpires and the Technical Commissioners shall contact the Technical Director and the Umpire Director to let them know of any protest. No further game actions may be taken from the time the game is stopped until the protest is ruled upon, including pitching changes or player substitutions.

After consultation with the Technical Commissioners, the Umpires will render a ruling and that ruling will be final and not subject to appeal.

B3.3 When a participating delegation protests the participation of any player, the protest shall be presented to the Technical Commission of the competition prior to the conclusion of the competition.

B3.4 If the protest does not refer to an action of the game, it must be submitted in writing to the Technical Commission, explaining the reasons for the protest and the due dispositions that apply to it.

B3.5 The presentation of any protest, either during a game or outside of games, will incur a nonrefundable fee of \$200 UD to be directly deducted from the Participating Team's participation guarantee fee..

B4 APPEALS

B4.1 Only a Technical Commission decision that is not related to the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* may be appealed to a Jury of Appeal. Technical Commission's decisions related to the rules of the game are final and they can only appeal other items not related to game rules.

B4.2 The appeal, with a clear statement of the grounds on which the appeal is based and all supporting materials ("appeal brief"), must be in writing and served by Notice to the Jury of Appeal (to the WBSC Office), accompanied by a copy of the Decision. The presentation of an appeal will incur a non-refundable cost of USD 100 to be deducted directly from the National Federation's guarantee fee on the day of the receipt of the appeal brief or if necessary invoiced to the National Federation in question. Appeal briefs are confidential to the WBSC, the Jury of Appeal and the parties involved.

B4.3 The time limit to present an appeal brief (a) if during a competition is three (3) hours or (b) if after a competition has ended is 48 hours, which periods start from the delivery of a Notice of a Decision under Reg A7.5. An appeal brief may be amended only before the Jury of Appeal starts its deliberations, which time will be notified to the parties involved. An untimely appeal or a frivolous or vexatious appeal will be dismissed with no opportunity to resubmit the appeal. A materially misleading or incomplete appeal brief will be dismissed as an invalid appeal if the deficiencies that are notified to the person making the appeal by the Jury of Appeal are not corrected within a stated period of time to cure.

B4.4 Every appellant or the person that is the subject of or involved with the appeal has the right to present materials and statements to the Jury for it to consider. Each appellant or person involved may be represented by one person. The Jury may take statements, interview persons or review video or audio footage to help it consider the matter and render its decision. Once the appeal has been presented to the Jury, the Jury will meet, consider the matter and render a decision.

B4.5 A Jury of Appeal may reject an appeal in part or whole and will issue a written statement of its findings, which is, save for manifest error, final and not subject to further appeal. The Jury of Appeal may order a different penalty or increase or decrease a fine or suspension or outcome from that to which the appeal was made.

B4.6 In the event of an appeal involving the suspension of a player, coach or manager, a decision will be taken within three (3) hours, knowing that the decision of the Jury of Appeal could have a bearing on any subsequent games in the Competition. For all other matters a decision will be rendered within 24 hours.

B4.7 Notwithstanding any provision of these Regulations, a player, coach, or manager who is suspended for one game or more must sit out the next scheduled game to allow the Jury to complete its process and ensure due process.

B5 DELIVERY OF NOTICES

B5.1 The Technical Director, in cooperation with WBSC Headquarters, will deliver the written decision with a fine(s) or suspension to the interested parties, by "Notice" as outlined in the general norms making evident the time of delivery for the latter purposes of appealing.

B6 GAME PROTOCOL

B6.1 The following ceremony shall be used before and during all matches:

- a) The competition song/music supplied by the WBSC Headquarters shall be played to indicate the start of the ceremony and continue to be played in the background during the introductions;
- b) Before the game begins, the Public Address Announcer will first call the visiting team (manager and coaches first, then the players in the starting lineup by name, the pitcher in the bullpen and the rest of the roster) on to the field, followed by the home team and then the Umpires. The teams shall line up along the foul line, while the Umpires stand at home plate;
- c) When the teams are lined up, the flag of each country shall be displayed at the sides of the pitching mound by flag bearers;
- d) A 45-60 second version of the national anthems of the two teams, as approved by the WBSC, shall be played with the teams and Umpires lined up. During the national anthems, those involved must show a respectful posture with hats removed and refrain from talking, laughing, spitting, eating, and drinking;
- e) Music and sound effects should be used prior to, during and after each game in order to enhance a sense of cultural diversity and international competition. After the anthems and before the game starts, time shall be made available for any prize-giving, special recognition or announcement of special guests; and
- f) Only uniformed members of the team delegations are permitted on the field during the pre-game ceremony. Non-uniformed personnel must stay in dugouts or their designated seats.

B6.2 Demonstrations

Any type of demonstration by a team before, during or following a game must be managed in accordance with *WBSC World Cup Ceremony Guidelines* and its Appendices.

B6.3 Ceremonies

For information with regards to Opening, Closing and/or Ticket Punched Ceremonies refer to *WBSC World Cup Ceremony Guidelines* and its Appendices.

Note: Only uniformed members of the team delegations are permitted on the field during the ceremonies. Non-uniformed personnel must stay in dugouts or their designated area.

B7 COMPETITION SYSTEM

B7.1 6-Team Format (two stage World Cup: Group Stage – 2 groups of 6 teams)

- a) Opening Round—Single Round Robin

One (1) group of six (6) teams will play all other teams once in a single round robin format. At the completion of all single round robin games, the top two teams will earn a spot in the Finals.

b) Finals—Single Round Robin (1 group of 6 teams)

One (1) group of six (6) teams will play all other teams once in a single round robin format. At the completion of all single round robin games, the top-four teams will play in the Medal Games in the following manner:

- 1st and 2nd place teams after the Round Robin play the Gold Medal Game; and
- 3rd and 4th place teams after the Round Robin play the Bronze Medal Game.

B7.2 12-Team Format

a) Opening Round

Two (2) groups of six (6) Teams (1, 2), will play all vs. all, with the top three (3) teams from each group advancing to the Super Round. In case of a tie, see tie-breaking system. Bottom three (3) teams from each group will go to the Placement Round.

b) Super Round

The top three (3) teams from one group (1, 2), will play all vs. all against the top three (3) teams from the other group.

At the end of this round, the four (4) teams to play in the Finals will be determined based upon the results of the Opening Round between the three (3) qualified teams as well as the Super Round games (two games from the Opening Round and three games from the Super Round).

Ex: Team A, Team B and Team C qualified for the Super Round and D, E, F were eliminated after the Opening Round.

For team A, the records of A vs B and A vs C will count as well as the three (3) games from the Super Round, however the records of A vs D, A vs E and A vs F will not count.

c) Placement Round

The bottom three (3) teams from one group after the Opening Round will play all vs. all against the bottom three (3) teams from the other group.

At the end of this round, the standings among the six (6) teams will be determined based upon the results of the Opening Round between the three (3) teams that went to the Placement Round as well as the Placement Round games (two games from Opening Round and three games from Placement Round).

Example: Team D, Team E and Team F went to play Placement Round and A, B, C advanced to the Super Round. For team D, the records of D vs E and D vs F will count as well as three (3) games from the Placement Round, however the records of D vs A, D vs B and D vs C will not count.

d) Finals

The teams will play in the Final Round in the following manner:

- 1st and 2nd place teams after the Super Round play the Gold Medal Game; and
- 3rd and 4th place teams after the Super Round play the Bronze Medal Game.

C TECHNICAL ASPECTS

C1 UNIFORMS

C1.1 Uniform design and appearance must fulfil Rule 3.3 of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* and the *WBSC Baseball World Cup Uniform Guidelines*. Uniforms will be checked by members of the Technical Commission upon arrival of that team in the host country.

C1.2 According to Rule 3.3.2 of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*, each team must have at least two (2) sets of uniforms (jerseys) of contrasting colours. Black and White or Blue and Red are acceptable (Royal Blue and Navy Blue, or Red and Orange are not). The Home Team shall have preference to wear the colours of their national uniform, and the Visiting Team shall wear a colour that cannot get confused with the other one. The final decision on the colours to be worn by each Team for each game will be made at the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting. There will be no changes allowed to the established uniforms without prior approval of the Technical Commission. If a team requests a change to uniform colour, the said request must be submitted in writing to the Technical Commission, and the Technical Commission will also communicate to the team its decision (whether approved or disapproved) in writing.

C1.3 All players and uniformed coaches must wear a specified and different number on the back of the uniform. Uniform numbers must be whole numbers chosen from 0 to 99. As per Rule 3.3.3 of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*, numbers shall be at least 6 inches (0.15 m) in height and must be a solid contrasting colour that is clearly visible. Each uniformed individual must keep the same number during the competition. The numbers cannot be changed during the competition unless exceptional circumstances justifying such changes arise. In any case no numbers can be changed on the uniforms without the previous approval by the Technical Commissioners of the game. If any changes to uniform numbers are approved, then Technical Commissioners of the game will hand in both teams in writing such notice prior to the start of the game.

Note: Uniform design must be shared with the WBSC for approval no later than sixty (60) days prior to the event. Non-authorized emblems, logos and/or marks will not be allowed and subject to removal.

C2 COMPETITION VENUES

C2.1 All competition facilities shall fulfil the requirements established by the WBSC and will be subject to inspections by WBSC representatives to verify their use during WBSC Competitions.

Note: Refer to the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* to see specific field dimensions for U-12 Baseball World Cups and Women's Baseball World Cup

C3 GROUND RULES

C3.1 Ground rules related to the competition venue(s) will be proposed by the LOC before the start of the competition and approved by the Technical Director and Umpire Director. These rules shall be printed in both English, Spanish and the language of the host country and distributed to all Team Managers and Umpires and discussed thoroughly at the Pre-tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting. In addition, copies of the Ground Rules shall be posted in both dugouts of all competition venues. Ground rules shall be prepared by the LOC prior to the arrival of the Technical Director and Umpire Director and shall be completed after their site inspection before the Pre-tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting.

C4 DUGOUT

C4.1 The designation and assignment of clubhouses and dugouts shall be made by WBSC without regard to which team shall be the home team. WBSC will confirm the clubhouse designation at the Pre-Tournament Technical/Organisational Meeting.

C4.2 Only essential accredited personnel (uniformed players and coaches, translators, training staff, security personnel and/or delegation leader) will be allowed to stay in the dugout. The maximum number of people allowed in the dugout will vary based on each WBSC Baseball World Cup. The maximum number of team members allowed in the dugout for each WBSC World Cup is established in the chart below. There are no exceptions to this rule. It shall be the responsibility of the Technical Commissioners assigned to the game to make sure that unauthorised persons do not occupy the dugout and that all the authorised persons stay inside the dugout or are placed in alternative locations during the game. More than this number of people in the dugout will not be permitted, and teams in violation of this rule subject themselves to fines from the Technical Commission.

Note: all members shall be accredited and properly uniformed or in appropriate team apparel in order to be allowed in the dugout.

C4.3 No communication between any personnel in the dugout, clubhouse, bullpen or field of play and those outside the dugout, clubhouse, bullpen or field of play (including those in the stands) take place during games. Communication between the dugout and bullpens, field of play and/or clubhouse is allowed using approved means of communication only.

C5 PRACTICE SCHEDULE

C5.1 Pre-Tournament Official Practice

The LOC in conjunction with WBSC Event Staff, shall set up a Pre-Tournament schedule for all teams. Each team shall have a ninety (90) minute session at least once at the competition venue. If more than one competition venue is to be used, teams will be assigned to respective timeframes by WBSC. Assignments and schedule shall be made available to the teams prior to their arrival at the competition.

C5.2 Pre-Game Practice

The WBSC Event Department shall determine the site(s) of practice together with the LOC and Technical Commission. Refer to *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* for exact time allotments at each WBSC Baseball World Cup.

Note that while batting practice prior to the game is for a set number of minutes, it certainly can be less if a team desires. This does not, however, mean that the other team can hit for a longer period of time. Moreover, teams are not permitted to stretch, warm up, or be near the batting cage until BP for the other team is over. Teams should warm-up in an area outside the baseball field during this time. If no viable warm-up area exists (this will be the discretion of the Technical Commissioner), then teams are permitted to go to the far right or left field area during BP to warm-up during the other teams batting practice time. Should they do so, teams should provide someone to protect the players from getting hit baseballs during the batting practice time. The Technical Commissioner will be on site to assist with any difficulties during this time

C6 STARTING PITCHERS & LINE-UP

C6.1 Each team manager or delegated team official shall submit the name of their starting pitcher for the next day's game to the WBSC as follows:

- a) Day 1 starting pitchers will be submitted at the Pre-Tournament Technical / Organisational Meeting.
- b) All remaining days' starting pitchers must be submitted within one (1) hour after the conclusion of the previous day's game or games.

A public announcement shall be made by the WBSC for the relevant teams together. Following WBSC's official announcement or two (2) hours after the conclusion of the last game of the day, whichever comes first, teams can communicate their next game's starting pitcher to press and social media.

Any change to the declared starting pitcher shall be for a valid reason only and such announcement must immediately be communicated in person to the Technical Commissioners, when on site, and also communicated in writing to the Technical Director, along with the reason for making the change. The WBSC may request validation of injury or illness from WBSC Event Medical personnel. Opposing teams will be immediately notified of the change and, if appropriate, given the option to change their starting line-up. Failure to promptly inform WBSC of such a change, providing false or misleading information, or where the WBSC determines that the reasons given are not valid, will result

in disciplinary actions. Such actions may include, but are not limited to fines, ejection of the manager, and/or suspensions.

C6.2 Team Managers shall compulsorily present a tentative line-up card to the Technical Commissioner(s) ninety (90) minutes before the scheduled start of the game. This line-up is for information purposes only and whether the games are televised or not shall be duly communicated from the WBSC staff onsite in advance. This line-up shall include first and last names, uniform number, and field position of each player in the starting batting order and the pitcher. As per Rule 5.5.3 of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*, all other potential substitute players should also be listed, with their first and last name, uniform number, but the failure to list a player shall not make that player ineligible to enter the game. As per Rule 6.79 of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball*, a substitute is an eligible roster player who is not one of the players listed on the line-up card and has not been withdrawn or disqualified.

C6.3 The official line-up card will be given to the Home-plate Umpire at the meeting at home-plate immediately prior to the start of the game. A copy of the official line-up card shall be given to the opposite Team Manager, the Scorer(s) and Technical Commissioner(s) in charge of the game. The preliminary line-up is an important document and should not be misused. If there are changes between the preliminary and starting line-up, it must be announced immediately to the Technical Commissioner in charge of the game and to the opposing team. An injury or other extraordinary reason should be the only reason for changes in the preliminary line-up. Abuses in this regard will not be viewed lightly and are subject to disciplinary actions from the Technical Director.

C7 PLAYING RULES AND PACE OF PLAY

C7.1 Official Rules of Baseball

All games will be played under the event year of the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* (including the applicable sections in Appendices 1, 2 and 3) and the WBSC Umpire Manual Procedures and Interpretations unless noted in this section.

C7.2 Exceptions to the WBSC Official Rules of Baseball

- a) 18-inch bases may be used for the competition, as approved by the WBSC.
- b) Teams are allowed a maximum of three (3) “offensive meetings” per game. An “offensive meeting” shall be charged any time a Coach delays the game for any length of time to talk with an offensive player; whether it is the hitter, a base-runner, an on-deck batter going to the plate, or to another Coach. If the game goes to the extra innings, “offensive meetings” not done during the game will not be accumulated and only one additional “offensive meeting” shall be permitted for each three (3) extra innings. Failure to observe this rule will result in a warning to the Team Manager and if it occurs again the Team will be fined and the Team Manager shall be ejected from the game. No offensive trip will be charged if the offense discusses strategy during a delay for which they are not responsible (e.g. trip to the mound, injury, player change, etc.) proving they cause no further delay.

- c) A pitcher may take as many or as few warm-up pitches as desired within the timing allowed by the game clock regulations specified per event. There will not be a pitch clock enforced at the U-12 Baseball World Cup.
- d) For events using a pitch clock, if the batter is not in the batter's box ready to take the pitch with five seconds remaining on the clock, the batter will be penalised with a strike awarded to the pitcher.
- e) Each batter is allowed only one "Time" request per plate appearance. If a second "Time" is requested during the same plate appearance, the batter will be penalised with one strike. If a batter has already used his "Time" and is injured and must be replaced during the same at-bat, the substitute batter will not receive an additional time-out.
- f) Any requests to review a scoring decision must be communicated in writing within one (1) hour after a game ending.
- g) The "between innings infield clean-up" shall take place after the bottom of 4th inning (for seven-inning games) or after the bottom of the 5th inning (for nine-inning games) and will be limited to a maximum of five (5) minutes during the competition. The timing will be confirmed at each Pre-Tournament Technical and Organisational Meeting.

Note: ABS Review system is recommended for U-18 and U-23 Baseball World Cups.

C8 COMPETITION GAME SCHEDULE

C8.1 Once the competition game schedule has been approved by the WBSC, it becomes inviolable and can only be amended further to a new decision of the WBSC Executive Director, who is the only person entitled to sanction an amendment, after consultation with the LOC and all stakeholders. Nevertheless, if during the competition there are unforeseen and valid reasons requiring amendment to the schedule would be necessary, changes to the game schedule could be done through a joint proposal of the Technical Commission and WBSC Events Department to the WBSC Executive Director or the Tournament Director in his absence. The new game schedule shall officially be approved in writing by the Executive Director or the Tournament Director, before being released to all participants.

C9 SUSPENDED GAMES

Refer to the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* to see Suspended Games Regulations..

C10 HOME TEAM / VISITING TEAM ASSIGNMENTS

C10.1 Opening Round Home and Visitor game assignments are decided by WBSC once all participating countries are known. An attempt is made to ensure the number of Home and Visitor games is as equitable as possible.

C10.2 Establishing home and visitor teams in Super Round / Placement Round games shall be done in the following order:

- a) Based on the standings of the Opening Round. Teams with higher seed after the Opening Round will be home team (i.e. 1st from A vs 2nd from B, then 1st from A will be home team).
- b) By the drawing of lots if the seeding after the Opening Round is equal (i.e. 1st from pool A vs 1st from pool B).

C10.3 Establishing home and visitor teams in the Finals shall be based on the standings of the Super Round. Teams with higher seed after the Super Round will be home team (i.e. 1st vs 2nd, then 1st will be home team).

C11 STANDINGS & TIE BREAKING

C11.1 The standing of the teams after any round shall be according to the win-loss record of all the games played in the latest round.

C11.2 Should all games of any round have been played according to the game schedule, all ties after any round shall be settled in the order of the following list. That is, if criteria (1) does not break the tie(s), then it is no longer considered the criteria capable of breaking the tie, and the next criteria (2) will be used. This logic continues through the list, in order, until the tie(s) is/are broken using all games between the teams tied in the standings:

- a) Win-loss records in games between the teams tied.

Note: If two teams are tied, the team that won their game shall be placed in the higher position. If three or more teams are tied, the team(s) that has(have) a better win-loss record between the tied teams will be placed in the higher position(s).

- b) Team's Quality Balance (TQB) in games between the teams tied.

Note: If three or more teams are tied and when criterion 1 does not break any/all ties, the remaining tied teams will be ranked according to the TQB (highest to lowest). The TQB is calculated as follows: (runs scored / innings played at bat) – (runs allowed / innings playing on defence). For a three-way tie and when the TQB is needed to break the tie, the TQB will place all tied teams from highest to lowest placing.

- c) Best Earned Runs Team's Quality Balance (ER-TQB) in games between the teams tied.

Note: If three or more teams are tied and when criterion 1 and 2 do not break any/all ties, the remaining tied teams will be ranked according to the ER-TQB (highest to lowest). The ER-TQB is calculated as follows: (earned runs scored / innings played at bat) – (earned runs allowed / innings playing on defence). For a three-way tie and when the ER-TQB is needed to break the tie, the ER-TQB will place all tied teams from highest to lowest placing.

- d) Highest batting average in games between the teams tied.
- e) Tie breaking procedure as per Rule C11.3.
- f) A coin flip.

C11.3 In the event that NOT all games in a round have been played according to the game schedule, the following criteria apply to create the final standing of the round, in order:

- Win-loss records considering all the games played in the latest round.
- Where the games in common exist between tied teams, tie breaking procedure will follow the criteria listed under C11.2 until the tie is broken.

Where no games in common exist where games in common played are unequal, tie breaking procedure is done according to the following in order:

- Team's Quality Balance (TQB) between the teams with the same win-loss record considering all the games played in the latest round. The teams will be ranked based on TQB. The TQB is calculated as follows: (runs scored / innings played at bat) – (runs allowed / innings playing on defence).
- Best Earned Runs Team's Quality Balance (ER-TQB) between the teams with the same win-loss record considering all the games played in the latest round.
- Highest batting average of the teams with the same win-loss record considering all the games played in the latest round.
- A coin flip.

Two Examples of the application of the criteria to break a tie in case not all games of the round robin could be played.

C12 ALTERNATE DETERMINATION OF CHAMPION

In case of extreme weather conditions or any other reasons that prevent the completion of any round including the Finals, play proceeds as follows:

C12.1 Six (6) Teams in one (1) group events

Should the Technical Director and the Tournament Director, after consultation with the Local Organising Committee, verify the impossibility to play all the games in accordance with the event calendar, the following applies (in order):

a) Round Robin

- Each team must play at least three (3) games in the round robin before any further procedure to determine a standings considering the results in the event can be applied;
- If one or more teams have not played at least (3) games in the round robin, the final standing will be determined in accordance with the WBSC World Ranking at 31 December of the previous year.
- If all teams have played at least three (3) games, to create a group standing all teams will be ranked according to the tie breaking procedure as per Rule C11.3.
- All efforts will be made to complete the round robin by playing only the game(s) which remain to determine the top three teams.

b) Finals:

If the gold medal and/or bronze medal game cannot be played, the winner will be decided based on the following criteria, in order:

- Win and Loss record in the round robin;
- Head-to-head;

- Tie breaking procedure as per Rule C11.3.

C12.2 Twelve (12) Teams in two (2) groups events

Should the Technical Director and the Tournament Director, after consultation with the Local Organising Committee, verify the impossibility to play all the games in accordance with the event calendar, the following applies (in order):

a) Opening Round

- Each team must play at least three (3) games in the Opening Round before any further procedure to determine a group standing considering the results in the event can be applied;
- If one or more teams have not played at least (3) games in the Opening Round, the final standing will be determined in accordance with the WBSC World Ranking at 31 December of the previous year.
- If all teams have played at least three (3) games, to create a group standing all teams will be ranked according to the tie breaking procedure as per Rule C11.3.
- All efforts will be made to complete the Opening Round by playing only the game(s) which remain to determine the top two teams in each group.

b) Super Round / Placement Round:

- Cancel the remaining Super Round and Placement Round game(s) and have the top teams in each group to compete for the gold medal and the second place teams to compete for the bronze medal.
- All efforts will be made to complete the Super Round by playing only the game(s) which remain to determine the top four teams.
- To create a group standing all teams will be ranked according to the tie breaking procedure as per Rule C11.3.

c) Finals

If the gold medal and / or bronze medal game cannot be played the winner will be decided based on the following criteria, in order:

- Win and Loss record in the latest round.
- Head-to-head;
- Tie breaking procedure as per Rule C11.3.

D FOR THE USE AND CARE OF PROPERTY AND INSTALLATIONS

D1 Teams are responsible for the damages to or disappearance of property in the places where they will be accommodated during the competition. The following procedures will be applied.

- a) Each team is requested to inspect the accommodation upon arrival and, if applicable, prepare a written inspection report highlighting any broken item or missing parts from the premises at OTD disposal (i.e. rooms, common areas, restaurant etc..) which shall be sent to the LOC with a copy to the WBSC Office, within forty-eight hours from arrival
- b) Each team may request to the LOC a certificate in writing to certify that the LOC does not have any claim for damages or disappearance of property against the team or any of its members and that it does not know of the existence of any claim against the team.
- c) Should any damage or disappearance of property be registered by the LOC, a written invoice will specify the damages claimed, the disappeared article(s), name and address of the affected person(s) and amount of the claimed compensation, with supporting documentation when available.

D2 In the event of a claim for damages and/or disappearance of property against a team, the LOC and the WBSC will conduct a complete investigation of the events and propose the corresponding steps to be taken.

D3 Failure to fulfil the stipulations of this Regulation (within forty-eight hours from the end of the competition) shall mean that the LOC loses the right to make any claim for damages or disappearance of property against any offending team and the WBSC.

E OTHER MATTERS

E1 USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES

The use of social media by participants is not allowed during the games.

Fans can follow the official online play-by-play, live-stream and/or @WBSC. Press officers stationed in designated press zones are encouraged to share posts (no video footage of game) to social media during the games but may not communicate to official team personnel during a game.

The use of electronic devices is forbidden during the games. None of the electronic devices such as cellular phones, laptops, tablets, video cameras, walkie-talkies, smart watches or ear buds shall be used by team personnel on the field, in the dugout, bullpen and clubhouse or to communicate to team personnel on the field, in the dugout, bullpen, clubhouse and/or stands.

Team staff members are allowed into the stands but must remain there for the entire duration of the game. Such persons must not be in game uniform. They may use electronic devices but may not communicate with team members in the dugout, clubhouse, bullpen or on the playing field for the duration of the game. However, the use of electronic devices is prohibited when in and close to dugouts. Before and after a game, use of such electronic devices is allowed.

If any violation is detected, the individual(s) and National Federation(s) in question will subject themselves to fines, sanctions, and penalties by WBSC.

E2 TEAM PRESENTATION

All team members must wear at all times official game uniform or non-uniform official apparel provided by their National Federation ("team apparel") at the competition venues. In particular, players, coaches and managers must wear game uniforms during their stay at the venues when participating in official activities (e.g. games, ceremonies, any other events as requested by WBSC). Persons other than players, coaches, and managers in the dugout during the games, must wear official team apparel provided by their respective teams or organisations. All delegation members must be mindful of how their teams are presented and perceived and must maintain professional attire at all times at the venues.

E3 NO SMOKING, SMOKELESS TOBACCO OR DRINKING ALCOHOL

No team member is permitted to use tobacco in any form, smoking or chewing, including vaping and e-cigarettes, or drink alcohol, in places that are visible to the public, including audiences on media outlets such as TV, social media and internet streaming, etc. It is the responsibility of the Delegation leader to ensure such smoking or drinking is not seen by the public as long as they are in competition venues and practice facilities as well as other competition official activities. Any violation will be taken seriously, and violators would be subject to disciplinary action as WBSC may deem appropriate. The use of smokeless tobacco is prohibited for team members during televised interviews or appearances. While spectators and/or media are permitted into the competition venue, the Delegation

leader must ensure that such tobacco or alcohol products (including tobacco tins or packages) are not visible to the audience.

F FINAL DISPOSITIONS

F1 The Hosting Agreement signed between the WBSC and the LOC establishes the rules and the general norms under which the competition shall be conducted, as well as the obligations and responsibilities of each of the parties. This document serves as a non-restrictive complement to said Agreement.

F2 During the course of a competition, the WBSC Executive Director, the Technical Director and the LOC shall have the authority to jointly make decisions on any point not specifically covered in this document. In any aspects where there is no mutual agreement, the WBSC Executive Director will be the final authority.

F3 Any unforeseen circumstances which arise and are not specified in the WBSC Tournament Regulations, then the WBSC Statutes, Disciplinary Rules, Code of Ethics, Protocol, Sanction Procedure and International Game Rules and other WBSC official documents as well as the *WBSC Official Rules of Baseball* will serve as the primary source of guidance for all WBSC Tournament Officials and will be interpreted and applied by the WBSC Executive Director.
